The *PXI-1011 Chassis User Manual* describes the features of the PXI-1011 chassis and contains information about configuring the chassis, installing the data acquisition (DAQ) and SCXI modules, and operating the chassis.

- *PXI-1011 Chassis User Manual*—Read this manual first for maintenance information on the chassis and installation instructions. This manual serves as the SCXI chassis manual.
- *Getting Started with SCXI*—Read this manual second. It gives an overview of the SCXI system and contains the most commonly needed information for modules, chassis, and software.
- The SCXI user manuals and installation guides—Read these documents next for information about signal connections and module configuration. They also explain in greater detail how the module works and contain application tips/strategies.
- The DAQ user manuals and installation guides—This documentation has detailed information about the DAQ hardware that plugs into or is connected to the chassis. Use these documents for hardware installation and configuration instructions, specification information about the DAQ hardware, and application hints.
- Software documentation—You might have several sets of software documentation. After you have set up the hardware system, use either the application software (LabVIEW or Measurement Studio) or the NI-DAQ documentation to help you write your application.
- Accessory installation guides or manuals—If you are using accessory products, these installation guides or user manuals explain how to physically attach accessories to the system. Also consult these guides when you make signal connections.

Related Documentation

If you are designing your own PXI module, the *PXI Specification*, Revision 2.0, which is available at pxia.org, describes the physical, electrical, and timing requirements for PXI.

Introduction

This chapter describes the PXI-1011, lists what you need to get started, describes the optional equipment, and explains how to unpack the PXI-1011 chassis.

About the PXI-1011 Chassis

The PXI-1011 chassis integrates a high-performance 4-slot PXI subsystem with an 8-slot SCXI subsystem to offer a complete solution for signal conditioning and switching applications. The PXI section of the chassis accepts an embedded controller or a MXI-3 interface, and a wide variety of modules—such as multifunction I/O (MIO), digital I/O (DIO), and computer-based instrument modules. The eight SCXI slots integrate signal conditioning modules into the PXI system. These modules provide analog and digital input conditioning, isolation, and other functions. You can daisy chain additional SCXI chassis to add more signal-conditioning channels. Refer to the *SCXI-1346 Shielded Multi-Chassis Cable Adapter Installation Guide* for more information on using the PXI-1011 in daisy-chained multi-chassis systems.

Unpacking

While unpacking the PXI-1011, do the following:

- Carefully inspect the shipping container and the chassis for damage.
- Look for visible damage to the chassis enclosure.
- Make sure all handles, external hardware, and switches are undamaged.
- Inspect the chassis slots for any possible damage, debris, or detached components.
- If damage appears to have been caused during shipment, file a claim with the carrier.
- Retain the packing material for possible inspection and/or reshipment.

Key Features

The PXI-1011 combines a high-performance 4-slot PXI subsystem with an 8-slot SCXI subsystem. The PXI-1011 has a structural design that is optimized for use in a wide range of applications. The PXI-1011 fully complies with the *PXI Specification*, Revision 2.0, offering advanced timing and synchronization features.

The PXI-1011 has a built-in interconnection between the PXI and SCXI subsystems that allows a DAQ/DMM module in the fourth PXI slot to control the SCXI subsystem without additional cables. The SCXI subsystem provides a low-noise environment for signal conditioning. It supplies power and control circuitry for SCXI modules. You can use the PXI-1011 chassis with current and future SCXI modules.

Chassis Description

Figure 1-1 shows the front view of the PXI-1011. Table 1-2 describes the front view items.



Figure 1-1. Front View of the PXI-1011 Chassis

Item	Description
System Power Switch	Turns the chassis on and off.
System Power Indicator LED	When lit, indicates that the chassis is on. The PXI subsystem is always powered as long as the chassis is on.
SCXI Subsystem Power Indicator LED	When lit, indicates that the SCXI subsystem power is on. You can turn on/off the SCXI subsystem power using the SCXI subsystem power switch on the rear panel, while the system power switch is on.
SCXI Low-Voltage Analog Bus Connectors	Connect to the low-voltage analog bus (LVAB <03>) on the SCXI subsystem backplane.
SCXI High-Voltage Analog Bus Connectors	Connect to the high-voltage analog bus (HVAB <03>) on the SCXI high-voltage backplane.
PXI Backplane Connectors	Connect PXI modules to the PXIbus.
SCXI Front-Threaded Strips	Secure modules in the SCXI subsystem and attach SCXI terminal blocks.
SCXI High-Voltage Backplane	Brings high-voltage analog bus (HVAB <03>) connections to SCXI modules.
SCXI Module Guides	Guide modules to SCXIbus connectors.
SCXI Module Slots	Hold SCXI modules.
SCXI Subsystem Backplane	Brings power, control lines, and low-voltage analog bus connections to SCXI modules.
PXI Subsystem Backplane	Brings CompactPCI 64-bit bus, PXI trigger bus, PXI star trigger bus, and PXI local bus connections to PXI modules.
PXI Peripheral Slots	Hold PXI peripheral modules.
PXI Star Trigger Slot	Holds PXI star trigger controller or any PXI peripheral module.
PXI System Controller Slot	Holds PXI system controller.
PXI Module Guides	Guide PXI modules to PXIbus connectors.

Item	Description
Fans and Filters	Cool the chassis; prevent dirt from contaminating the chassis circuitry.
SCXI Subsystem Power Switch	Turns on/off SCXI subsystem power when the system power is on.
SCXI High-Voltage Analog Bus Connector	Connects to the high-voltage analog bus on the SCXI high-voltage backplane.
SCXI Auxiliary I/O Connector	Connects to the control lines on the SCXI subsystem backplane.
SCXI Low-Voltage Analog Bus Connector	Connects to the low-voltage analog bus on the SCXI subsystem backplane.
Circuit Breaker	Protects you and the chassis from electrical injury/damage in case of an overcurrent fault.
Power Entry Module	IEC receptacle for power input.
Chassis Ground Screw	Provides a place to make a connection to the safety earth ground.

SCXI Subsystem Overview

You can install several modules in the SCXI subsystem and use a DAQ/DMM module in slot 4 of the PXI subsystem to control and/or acquire data from all the SCXI modules.



Note The chassis address of the SCXI subsystem is hard-wired as 0 when configuring the SCXI subsystem.

PXI Subsystem Overview

The following sections describe the PXI subsystem.

Interoperability with CompactPCI

The PXI subsystem is interoperable with PXI-compatible products and standard CompactPCI products. This feature is important because many PXI-compatible systems require components that do not implement PXI-specific features.

For example, you may want to use a standard CompactPCI network interface card in a PXI chassis. The signals on the PXI-1011 backplane P1 connector meet the requirements of the CompactPCI specification for both the peripheral and system modules. The PXI-specific signals are located on the P2 connector and are found only on the lines that are reserved or not used in the CompactPCI 64-bit specification. Therefore, all modules that meet the CompactPCI 64-bit specification requirements function in the PXI-1011.

System Controller Slot

Slot 1 is the System Controller slot of the chassis as defined by the PXI specification. It has three controller expansion slots, which are used for system controller modules wider than one slot. As defined in the PXI specification, these slots allow the controller to expand to the left, so it does not fill all the peripheral slots.

Peripheral Slots

Slots 2 through 4 are the three PXI-1011 peripheral slots. You can use PXI modules in peripheral slots to add functionality to the PXI subsystem not already provided by the system controller. Examples of PXI peripheral modules are MIO, DIO, and instrument modules. Some peripheral slots also have special capabilities, such as the Star Trigger (slot 2) and the SCXI Control (slot 4).

Star Trigger Slot

Slot 2 is the Star Trigger slot. This slot has a dedicated equal-length trigger line connected to each peripheral slot (see Figure 1-3) and is intended for modules with Star Trigger functionality to provide individual triggers to all other peripheral modules. However, if you do not require advanced trigger functionality, you can install any standard peripheral module into this slot.

Local Bus

The PXI backplane local bus is a daisy-chained bus that connects each PXI peripheral slot with its adjacent left and right peripheral slots, as shown in Figure 1-3.



Figure 1-3. PXI Star Trigger and Local Bus Routing

For example, the right local bus of each PXI peripheral slot connects to the left local bus of the adjacent slot and so on. Each local bus is 13 lines wide and can pass analog signals between modules or provide a high-speed side-band communication path that does not affect the PXI bandwidth.

Local bus signals can range from high-speed TTL signals to analog signals as high as 42 V. Keying of adjacent modules is implemented by initialization software that prohibits the use of incompatible modules. The pxisys.ini initialization file describes the PXI system configuration and the chassis.ini initialization file describes the functionality of the chassis. The .ini files use the configuration information specific to each peripheral module to evaluate compatibility before enabling local bus circuitry. This method provides a flexible means for defining local bus functionality that is not limited by hardware keying. The PXI-SCXI interface described in the *SCXI Control Slot* section is a typical application.

SCXI Control Slot

Slot 4 of the PXI backplane has connections for a PXI peripheral module to control the SCXI subsystem. These connections use the available local bus right pins (PXI_LBR0:12). The SCXI connection passes communication, timing, and low-voltage analog bus signals between the SCXI subsystem and the PXI module in slot 4.



Note For more information about the local bus right pins, see the *PXI Specification*, Revision 2.0.

Trigger Bus

The eight PXI trigger lines are routed to each slot. You can use the trigger lines in a variety of ways. For example, you can use triggers to synchronize the operation of several different PXI peripheral modules. In other applications, one module can control carefully timed sequences of operations performed on other modules in the system. Modules can pass triggers to one another, allowing precisely timed responses to the asynchronous external events the system monitors or controls.

System-Reference Clock

The PXI-1011 supplies the PXI 10 MHz system-clock signal (PXI_CLK10) independently to each peripheral slot. An independent buffer, having a source impedance matched to the backplane and a skew of less than 1 ns between slots, drives the clock signal to each peripheral slot. You can use this common-reference clock signal to synchronize multiple modules in a measurement or control system.



Caution 400 Hz power applications—The PXI-1011 can operate on 400 Hz power systems, but it is not qualified for use in aircraft. A navigation hazard can exist if the PXI-1011 is operated in flight with common avionics in use.



Installing and Configuring the PXI-1011

This chapter provides safety information and describes how to install and configure the PXI-1011 chassis.

Safety Information

The following section contains important safety information that you *must* follow when installing and using the product.

Do *not* operate the product in a manner not specified in this document. Misuse of the product can result in a hazard. You can compromise the safety protection built into the product if the product is damaged in any way. If the product is damaged, return it to NI for repair.

Do *not* substitute parts or modify the product except as described in this document. Use the product only with the chassis, modules, accessories, and cables specified in the installation instructions. You *must* have all covers and filler panels installed during operation of the product.

Do *not* operate the product in an explosive atmosphere or where there may be flammable gases or fumes. Operate the product only at or below the pollution degree stated in Appendix A, *Specifications*. Pollution is foreign matter in a solid, liquid, or gaseous state that can reduce dielectric strength or surface resistivity. The following is a description of pollution degrees:

- Pollution degree 1 means no pollution or only dry, nonconductive pollution occurs. The pollution has no influence.
- Pollution degree 2 means that only nonconductive pollution occurs in most cases. Occasionally, however, a temporary conductivity caused by condensation must be expected.
- Pollution degree 3 means that conductive pollution occurs, or dry, nonconductive pollution occurs that becomes conductive due to condensation.

Clean the product with a soft nonmetallic brush. Make sure that the product is completely dry and free from contaminants before returning it to service.

You *must* insulate signal connections for the maximum voltage for which the product or any installed module is rated. Do *not* exceed the maximum ratings for the product. Remove power from signal lines before connecting them to or disconnecting them from the product.

Operate this product only at or below the installation category stated in the Appendix A, *Specifications*.

The following is a description of installation categories:

• Installation category I is for measurements performed on circuits not directly connected to MAINS.¹ This category is a signal level such as voltages on a printed wire board (PWB) on the secondary of an isolation transformer.

Examples of installation category I are measurements on circuits not derived from MAINS and specially protected (internal) MAINS-derived circuits.

• Installation category II is for measurements performed on circuits directly connected to the low-voltage installation. This category refers to local-level distribution such as that provided by a standard wall outlet.

Examples of installation category II are measurements on household appliances, portable tools, and similar equipment.

• Installation category III is for measurements performed in the building installation. This category is a distribution level referring to hard-wired equipment that does not rely on standard building insulation.

Examples of installation category III include measurements on distribution circuits and circuit breakers. Other examples of installation category III are wiring including cables, bus-bars, junction boxes, switches, socket outlets in the building/fixed installation, and equipment for industrial use, such as stationary motors with a permanent connection to the building/fixed installation.

• Installation category IV is for measurements performed at the source of the low-voltage (<1,000 V) installation.

¹ MAINS is defined as the electricity supply system to which the equipment concerned is designed to be connected either for powering the equipment or for measurement purposes.

Examples of category IV are electric meters, and measurements on primary overcurrent protection devices and ripple-control units.

Below is a diagram of a sample installation.



Mounting Information

The PXI-1011 is designed to operate on a bench or in an instrument rack. Determine where you will use the PXI-1011 and follow the appropriate installation instructions.

Apertures in the rear and along both sides of the chassis facilitate power supply and module cooling. Air enters through filters and fan inlets located in the lower rear of the chassis and exits through the upper sections in the rear and along the sides. Place the PXI-1011 on a bench or in an instrument rack so that the fans (air inlets) and the air outlet apertures along both sides of the chassis have adequate ventilation. Keep other equipment a minimum of 10 cm (4 in.) away from the air inlets and outlets.

Install the chassis with easy access to the rear panel to simplify air filter maintenance and provide easy access to the SCXI subsystem power switch.

Rack-mount installations require the optional rack-mount kit available from NI. Refer to the *PXI-1011 Chassis Rack-Mount Kit Installation Guide* to install the *PXI-1011* in an instrument rack.

PXI-1011 Chassis Installation

Caution Equipment described in this document *must* be used in an installation category II environment in accordance with IEC 60664. This category requires local-level supply MAINS-connected installation.

Connecting Safety Ground



Caution The PXI-1011 chassis is designed with a three-wire style cord that connects the ground (protective earth) line to the chassis ground. To minimize shock hazard, the electrical power outlet *must* have an appropriate earth safety ground that is connected whenever you use the chassis.

If the power outlet does not have an appropriate ground connection or the power frequency is above 63 Hz, you must connect the premise safety ground to the chassis grounding screw located on the rear panel. Refer to Figure 2-1 to connect the safety ground, while completing the following steps:

- 1. Connect a 16 AWG (1.3 mm diameter) or larger wire to the chassis grounding screw using the supplied 10-32 screw and a toothed lug. The copper wire must have green insulation with a yellow stripe or must be non-insulated (bare).
- 2. Attach the other end of the wire to permanent earth ground using toothed washers or a toothed lug.



Caution The electrical wiring codes in your area may not consider soldered connections as reliable. A crimp style connector is recommended with two crimps applied to improve reliability.

Installing the PXI-1011

Follow these steps to install the PXI-1011 chassis:

- 1. Place the PXI chassis on a sturdy, level surface. Leave at least 10 cm (4 in.) of space behind the chassis for adequate air circulation.
- 2. Turn off the system using the power switch shown in Figure 1-1, *Front View of the PXI-1011 Chassis*. When the pushbutton is in the *out* position, the system power is off.
- 3. Insert the female end of the power cable into the power-entry module.
- 4. Insert the male end of the power cable into the wall outlet.
- 5. Install the SCXI and PXI modules into the chassis as described in the *Installing an SCXI Module* and *Installing a PXI Module* sections.
- 6. Install front filler panels if needed (see the *Installing PXI Filler Panels* and the *Installing SCXI-1360 Filler Panels* sections for installation details).
- 7. Turn on the system using the power switch.

The system power indicator LED should be lit now, which indicates that system power is available to both the PXI and SCXI subsystems. The PXI subsystem remains powered as long as the system power is on. However, you can control the SCXI subsystem using the power switch on the rear panel.

8. If the SCXI subsystem power indicator LED is lit, then the SCXI subsystem power is on. If not, turn on the SCXI subsystem using the power switch on the rear panel. You can use the SCXI subsystem power switch to power the SCXI subsystem on/off only when the system power is on.

Installing a PXI Module

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Caution Before installing CompactPCI or PXI modules, *turn off* the system using the power switch shown in Figure 1-1, *Front View of the PXI-1011 Chassis*.



Note Remove any rubber thread protectors from the PXI module mounting screws before you install the module.

Follow these steps to install a PXI module into the PXI subsystem:

- 1. Place the module edges into the PXI chassis module guides (top and bottom), as shown in Figure 1-1, *Front View of the PXI-1011 Chassis*.
- 2. Slide the module to the rear of the chassis, making sure that the injector/ejector handle is pushed down, as shown in Figure 2-2.





- 3. When you begin to feel resistance, push up on the injector/ejector handle to inject the module into the frame.
- 4. Secure the front panel of the module to the chassis using the module front-panel mounting screws.

Installing PXI Filler Panels

To optimize chassis cooling performance, install filler panels into unused or empty slots. Secure the filler panels with the captive mounting screws. M

Installing an SCXI Module

Note Remove any rubber thread protectors from the SCXI module mounting screws before you install the module.

Follow these steps to install an SCXI module:

- 1. Turn off the SCXI subsystem using the switch shown in Figure 1-2, *Rear View of the PXI-1011 Chassis*, or turn off the system power.
- 2. Remove the front filler panel of an unused SCXI slot.
- 3. Insert the module into the module guide rails and slide the module to the back of the chassis. Do *not* force the module into place.
- 4. Fasten the front panel of the module to the top and bottom threaded strips of the SCXI subsystem using the thumbscrews on the module front panel.
- 5. Refer to the module user manual and install any necessary cables, cable accessories, or terminal blocks.

Refer to the SCXI module and terminal block documentation for specific instructions related to configuration and signal connections.

Installing SCXI-1360 Filler Panels

The SCXI-1360 filler panels protect the inside of the SCXI subsystem by preventing unwanted material from entering the PXI-1011 chassis and damaging modules or forming conductive paths that can degrade performance. Install all SCXI modules first, then, in any unused SCXI slots, install filler panels.

Filler panels are the full height of a slot. Follow these steps to install SCXI-1360 filler panels:

- 1. Place the filler panel with the captive screws in front of an unused SCXI slot. Line up the screws with the threaded strip holes.
- 2. Using a flat-blade screwdriver, screw the two captive screws into the threaded strip holes.

System Configuration and Initialization Files

The PXI specification allows many combinations of PXI chassis and system modules. To assist system integrators, the manufacturers of PXI chassis and system modules must document the capabilities of their products. The minimum documentation requirements are contained in .ini files, which consist of ASCII text. The system integrator can read the .ini files, and configuration utilities and device drivers can also use them.

The documentation for the PXI-1011 chassis is contained in the chassis.ini file on the diskette that comes with the chassis. The information in this file is combined with information about the system controller into a single system initialization file called pxisys.ini (PXI System Initialization). The system controller manufacturer either provides a pxisys.ini file for the particular chassis model that contains the system controller or provides a utility that can read an arbitrary chassis.ini file and generate the corresponding pxisys.ini file. System controllers from NI provide the pxisys.ini file for the PXI-1011 chassis, so you should not need to use the chassis.ini file. Refer to the documentation provided by the system controller for more information on pxisys.ini and chassis.ini files.

Device drivers and other utility software read the pxisys.ini file to determine information about the system. The device drivers should have no need to directly read the chassis.ini file. For detailed information regarding initialization files, please refer to the PXI specification at pxisa.org.

Maintaining the PXI-1011

This chapter describes basic maintenance procedures for the PXI-1011 chassis.

Maintenance Procedures

Service Interval

Clean the chassis fan filters every six months. Depending on chassis use and ambient dust levels in the operating environment, the filters may require more frequent cleaning.

Clean dust from the chassis exterior and interior as needed, based on the operating environment. Periodic cleaning increases reliability.

Preparation

The information in this section is designed for use by qualified service personnel. Read the *Safety Information* section in Chapter 2, *Installing and Configuring the PXI-1011*, before attempting any procedures in this chapter.

Caution Many components within the chassis are susceptible to static discharge damage. Service the chassis only in a static-free environment. Observe standard handling precautions for static-sensitive devices while servicing the chassis. *Always* wear a grounded wrist strap or equivalent while servicing the chassis.

Cleaning

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Cleaning procedures consist of cleaning the exterior and interior of the chassis and the fan filters. Refer to the PXI module documentation for information on cleaning the individual CompactPCI or PXI modules.



Caution *Always* turn off the chassis and disconnect the power cable before cleaning or servicing the chassis.

Cleaning the Interior

Use a dry, low-velocity stream of air to clean the chassis interior. Use a soft-bristle brush for cleaning around components. If you must use a liquid for minor interior cleaning, use a 75% isopropyl alcohol solution and rinse with deionized water.

Cleaning the Exterior

Clean the exterior surfaces of the chassis with a dry, lint-free cloth or a soft-bristle brush. If any dirt remains, wipe with a cloth moistened in a mild soap solution. Remove any soap residue by wiping with a cloth moistened with clear water. Do not use abrasive compounds on any part of the chassis.

Cautions Avoid getting moisture inside the chassis during exterior cleaning. Use just enough moisture to dampen the cloth.

Do *not* wash the front- or rear-panel connectors or switches. Cover these components while cleaning the chassis.

Do *not* use chemical cleaning agents—they can damage the chassis. Avoid chemicals that contain benzene, toluene, xylene, acetone, or similar solvents.

Cleaning the Fan Filter

To easily remove the chassis cooling filters from the rear of the chassis, turn off the chassis and remove the plastic housing attached to each fan, as shown in Figure 1-2, *Rear View of the PXI-1011 Chassis*.

To clean the fan filters, wash them in a mild soap solution, and then vacuum them or blow air through them. Rinse the filters with water and allow them to dry before reinstalling them onto the chassis.

Resetting the AC Main Circuit Breaker

If the PXI chassis encounters an overcurrent condition, the circuit breaker located on the rear panel trips to prevent chassis damage. Refer to Figure 1-1, *Front View of the PXI-1011 Chassis*, and Figure 1-2, *Rear View of the PXI-1011 Chassis*, and complete the following steps to reset the circuit breaker:

- 1. Turn off the system using the power switch.
- 2. Depress the circuit breaker to reset it.
- 3. Turn on the system using the power switch.

If the circuit breaker trips again, perform the following steps:

- 1. Turn off the system using the power switch.
- 2. Remove all the PXI and SCXI modules from the chassis.
- 3. Depress the circuit breaker to reset it.
- 4. Turn on the system using the power switch and verify that the circuit breaker does not trip.
- 5. Verify that the PXI-1011 can meet the power requirements of the CompactPCI and PXI modules. Overloading the chassis can trip the breaker. Refer to Appendix A, *Specifications*, for power requirements.
- 6. The overcurrent condition that caused the circuit breaker to trip can be due to a faulty CompactPCI or PXI module. Refer to the module documentation to troubleshoot faulty modules.

Troubleshooting the PXI-1011

Refer to Table 3-1 to troubleshoot power failure problems for the PXI-1011 chassis. The table lists possible causes for power failure and recommends ways to correct the problem.

Possible Cause	What to Do
PXI-1011 chassis is not connected to power source.	Make sure that the PXI-1011 is connected to a live electrical outlet. Try operating another piece of equipment from this outlet.
System power switch is not turned on.	Set the system power switch to the <i>ON</i> (pushed in) position.
SCXI power switch is not turned on.	Set the SCXI power switch to the ON position.
Short-circuit condition exists.	Remove all modules from the chassis. Carefully inspect each module and remove the short-circuit condition.
Circuit breaker is tripped.	Reset the circuit breaker. Refer to the <i>Resetting the AC</i> <i>Main Circuit Breaker</i> section in this chapter.
Power supply has failed.	Contact NI through your sales representative or ni.com/support.

Common Questions

This appendix lists common questions related to the use of the PXI-1011 chassis.

How do I obtain the most current version of NI-DAQ?

You can obtain the most current version of NI-DAQ at ni.com/downloads.

Where can I obtain the correct pxisys.ini file to use with my PXI-1011 chassis and system controller?

You can obtain the pxisys.ini file by going to ni.com/support/pxi and searching for the pxisys.ini file you need.

How do I use MAX to configure the SCXI subsystem in a PXI-1011 chassis?

- 1. Launch Measurement & Automation Explorer.
- 2. Locate **Devices and Interfaces** in the left-hand pane of the MAX window. Right-click the entry and choose **Create New...** from the pop-up menu.
- 3. In the **Create New** window select the PXI-1011 chassis and click **Finish**.
- 4. If the monitor displays an error message stating that the pxisys.ini file was not located, make sure that you have the current version of NI-DAQ and the appropriate pxisys.ini file for the controller and chassis. You must also verify that the pxisys.ini file is in the correct directory as shown in Table C-1.

- 5. If the **Control SCXI with Internal Bus** option is grayed out, check the following:
 - a. Make sure you have the current version of NI-DAQ.
 - b. Make sure the PXI DAQ or DMM module is in the PXI slot closest to the SCXI subsystem.
 - c. Make sure the SCXI subsystem is turned on.
 - d. Verify that you have the correct pxisys.ini file.

Note You cannot control the SCXI subsystem using the internal bus until you can select this option. If the **Control SCXI with Internal Bus** option is grayed out, you cannot work around this limitation by manually adding the SCXI modules using MAX.

6. Click **OK**, and you are prompted to auto-detect any SCXI modules that have been installed. Make sure that the SCXI subsystem is turned on. Click **Yes** to auto-detect the modules.

The chassis should now appear in the **Devices and Interfaces** section of MAX.

After installation, you can manually configure additional modules by right-clicking on the SCXI slots available in the PXI chassis sub-menu (under **Devices and Interfaces**) and choosing **Insert...** from the pop-up menu.

How do I configure the SCXI subsystem in an RT-series PXI-1011 chassis?

- 1. Launch Measurement & Automation Explorer.
- To launch Remote DAQ Configuration, select Tools»NI-DAQ Configuration»Remote DAQ Configuration. Type the RT engine IP address, and password if necessary. Click OK.

- 3. Highlight SCXI chassis in the **Remote DAQ Configuration** window, and click **Add**. Select the SCXI chassis and click **Next**. Select PXI-1011 from the list and click **Next**. Verify the chassis ID and click **Finish**.
- 4. Expand the PXI-1011 entry to configure the SCXI modules in the chassis. Click the SCXI slots available in the PXI chassis sub-menu and click **Add**. Choose **SCXI Module** and click **Next**. Select the correct slot and module from the list and follow the instructions to complete the configuration.
- 5. Make sure that you have the current version of NI-DAQ and the correct version of pxisys.ini. Verify that the pxisys.ini file is in the correct directory. You can download the appropriate pxisys.ini file from ni.com/support. When using any PXI RT system, the pxisys.ini file resides in the following two locations:
 - The host Windows machine has a copy that is downloaded to any target on which you are updating software. This location is in the RT Images folder, which is located at ~\National Instruments\RT Images.
 - The RT Series PXI controller has a copy in the c:\ni-rt\ system\ folder. This is the actual file the RT system uses to configure its PXI backplane.
- 6. If the **Control SCXI with Internal Bus** option is grayed out, check the following:
 - Make sure you have the current version of NI-DAQ. You can download the most current version of NI-DAQ at ni.com/downloads.
 - b. Make sure the PXI DAQ or DMM module is in the PXI slot closest to the SCXI subsystem.
 - c. Make sure the SCXI subsystem is turned on.
 - d. Make sure that you have the correct pxisys.ini file for the PXI controller.



Note You cannot control the SCXI subsystem using the internal bus until you are allowed to select this option. If the **Control SCXI with Internal Bus** is grayed out, you can still have trouble communicating with the SCXI module, even if you add them manually.

PXI-8155/56, PXI-8155B/56B, and PXI-817X controllers ship with a floppy disk that contains a different pxisys.ini file for each chassis. Where should I put the pxisys.ini file on my computer?

Search for and remove any older versions of pxisys.ini file on the system. Put the new pxisys.ini file in the directory according to your operating system as shown in Table C-1.

Which address should I use for the SCXI subsystem in my PXI-1011 chassis?

The PXI-1011 chassis has no chassis-address switches and is internally hard-wired to an address of zero.

I use the *SCXI POWER* switch on the rear of the PXI-1011 chassis to toggle the SCXI subsystem power from *ON* to *OFF* while the PXI subsystem power remains *ON*. This permits me to safely remove/insert modules from/into the SCXI subsystem without shutting down the PXI controller and operating system. When I switch the SCXI subsystem power *ON* again, MAX sometimes reports erroneous information about which SCXI modules are currently in the SCXI subsystem. How do I correct this information?

NI recommends that you have the *SCXI POWER* switch, located on the rear of the PXI-1011 chassis, in the *ON* position when you turn on the power using the *SYSTEM POWER* switch, located on the front of the PXI-1011 chassis.

If at any point MAX cannot detect and verify the SCXI subsystem correctly, do the following:

- 1. Leave the SCXI POWER switch ON.
- 2. Shut down the operating system.
- 3. Turn the SYSTEM POWER switch OFF.
- 4. Turn the SYSTEM POWER switch ON.
- 5. Wait for the operating system to restart, and launch MAX again.

How do I get the modules in the SCXI subsystem of a PXI-1011 chassis to appear in a MXI-3 system?

First, make sure you have the latest version of NI-DAQ and the MXI-3 optimization software installed on the chassis. You must have a version 1.1 or later of the MXI-3 Optimization software. You can find this software at ni.com/downloads.

A typical PXI system, with an embedded computer, has a pxisys.ini file in the Windows or WinNT directory. Configuration software, such as that included with NI-DAQ, uses this file to determine the characteristics of the controller and the chassis that make up the PXI system. Part of the pxisys.ini file describes any external buses, such as the SCXIbus, that are coupled to one of the PXI slots. In the case of the PXI-1011 chassis, the contents of this file tell the controller that slot 4 of the PXI-1011 is connected to the SCXIbus.

A MXI-3 system controller is a PCI bus to PXI bus connection. It initially does not contain a pxisys.ini file. Since this file does not exist, initially there is no information about the SCXI modules in the PXI-1011 chassis.

You can correct the problem by copying the missing pxisys.ini file into the Windows or WinNT directory of the host computer. You can obtain the pxisys.ini file for the PXI-1011 by going to ni.com/support/pxi and searching for the pxisys.ini file you need. You must then modify this file to reflect the PCI bus characteristics that describe slot 4 of the PXI-1011 chassis. These characteristics include the PCI bus number (PCIBusNumber) and PCI device number (PCIDeviceNumber), and with MXI-3 these can vary from system to system due to the variety of PCI implementations on PC motherboards. The following information helps you modify the pxisys.ini file. To modify the pxisys.ini file, open the file in a text editor and locate the following section:

```
[Slot4]
IDSEL = 29
SecondaryBusNumber = 0
ExternalBackplaneInterface = SCXI
PCIBusNumber = 2
PCIDeviceNumber = 13
```

In a MXI-3 system, the PCIBusNumber can change depending on the layout of the host PCI motherboard and the PCI slot in which the primary MXI-3 board resides.

The way that you determine the PCI Bus Number depends on your operating system:

• Win32 operating systems with a Device Manager utility such as Windows 2000/98/95.

After you have installed the PXI DAQ or DMM module in the rightmost slot in the PXI-1011 chassis, open your **Device Manager Utility**, which you can usually find in **System Properties**. You should see an entry for **Data Acquisition Devices**. Expand this entry and you should find the PXI DAQ module which you installed in slot 4. Right-click this device and select **Properties**. Go to the tab labeled **NI-DAQ Information**. Here you find the appropriate PCI Bus Number to enter into your pxisys.ini file.

• Operating systems without a Device Manager utility such as Windows NT.

After you have installed the PXI DAQ or DMM module in the rightmost slot in the PXI-1011chassis, you can determine the proper PCI Bus Number from a log file generated by your MXI-3 optimization software. Search your system for a file called mxi3.log. After running the MXI-3 optimization software, this text file contains both the PCI bus number and the PCI device number for the DAQ card in the last slot of the PXI-1011 chassis. These numbers should be entered into the pxisys.ini file under the information for slot 4.

You can confirm that your pxisys.ini file is correct by adding the PXI-1011 chassis in MAX. With the PXI DAQ or DMM module in the rightmost slot, right-click **Devices and Interfaces** in MAX and select **Create New**. Select the PXI-1011 chassis from the list. The next screen prompt presents you with a check-box asking you to control SCXI with **Internal Bus**. If this checkbox is grayed out, you have not properly edited your pxisys.ini file.

How can I get my PXI-1011 chassis to connect through the SCXI backplane to my RT Series DAQ device over MXI-3?

When you configure the PXI-1011 in MAX, the option to **Control SCXI** with internal BUS is disabled even if the RT Series DAQ device, such as the 7030/6xxx, is located in slots 3 and 4.

To enable this option, you need to modify the pxisys.ini file. You must add the modified file to the Windows folder of the host computer.

To allow the computer to recognize the RT Series DAQ device as the SCXI backplane controller, you must exit the pxisys.ini file to specify where

the device is located. The pxisys.ini file has an entry for each slot of the PXI chassis, as follows:

```
[Slot2]
IDSEL = 31
SecondaryBusNumber = 0
ExternalBackplaneInterface = None
PCIBusNumber = 0
PCIDeviceNumber = 15
```

You must modify entries in slots 3 and 4. The architecture of the RT Series DAQ device is such that the motherboard is in slot 3 and on the PXI bus. The daughterboard in slot 4 connects to the SCXI backplane, but the daughterboard is not on the PXI bus. Therefore, you must change the following entries:

```
[Slot3]
IDSEL = 30
SecondaryBusNumber = 0
ExternalBackplaneInterface = None
PCIBusNumber = 0
PCIDeviceNumber = 14
[Slot4]
IDSEL = 29
SecondaryBusNumber = 0
ExternalBackplaneInterface = None
PCIBusNumber = 0
PCIDeviceNumber = 13
```

These changes reflect the RT Series DAQ motherboard (70xx) on the PXI bus and the daughterboard connection to the SCXI backplane. In order to find the PCIBusNumber for slot 3 when using Windows complete the following steps.

Note You do not need to modify the PCIDevice Number.

- 1. Open Device Manager.
- 2. Select the PCI-70*xx* under **DAQ Devices**. The bus number is listed under the **NI Device Information** tab.

- 3. Modify the PCIBusNumber for slot 3 to match what the **Device** Manager lists.
- 4. Slot 4 must connect to the SCXI backplane. Change the ExternalBackplaneInterface to SCXI.

If you use Windows NT, go to ni.com/support to obtain the MXI-3 Optimization Software utility, which returns the PCI bus number.

How do I use multiple SCXI chassis with a PXI-1011 chassis and E Series DAQ device?

The SCXI subsystem that is integrated into the PXI-1011 chassis communicates with a PXI DAQ or DMM module through an internal backplane. The SCXI subsystem uses a channel on the PXI DAQ module that is dedicated to the internal backplane, which frees analog channel 0 on the PXI DAQ module for other uses.

Keep the following in mind when adding one or more SCXI chassis to a PXI-1011 chassis:

- The integrated SCXI subsystem communicates through the internal backplane and additional external SCXI chassis are connected to the front of the PXI DAQ module that controls the integrated SCXI chassis.
- The integrated SCXI chassis is hard-wired for chassis address 0. You can arbitrarily assign the chassis ID.
- Give additional external SCXI chassis a chassis address and chassis ID that do not conflict with the values in MAX for the integrated SCXI chassis.

Example:

I have a PXI-1011 chassis with a PXI-6040E PXI DAQ module to control the integrated SCXI chassis. I want to add two SCXI-1001 chassis to this system.

Cable connections:

- Connect one of the SCXI-1001 chassis to the front of the PXI-6040E PXI DAQ module using an SH6868 cable and an SCXI-1346 cable adapter.
- 2. Daisy chain (connect in series) the second SCXI-1001 chassis to the first one using an SCXI-1349 cable adapter.

Configuration:

Use MAX to add the integrated SCXI subsystem and the two external SCXI-1001 chassis to the list of installed devices and interfaces. Use MAX and the front-panel switches on the external chassis to assign a unique chassis address and ID to each chassis, as shown in Table C-2.
